The total number of projects completed, 15,000, has been steady and is expected to remain so. As broken down by sector, however, work saw some interesting changes. Fees from corporate office projects rose 37 percent to \$158 million, while health care jumped a whopping 58 percent to \$51 million. Another interesting gainer: Government nearly tripled, to \$14 million, and is expected to rise another 15 percent. (Five out of 10 Rising Giants do work for the government.) Education, predominantly

In the fitness world, they call it a plateau. You've made solid gains for a while—or, if you're talking weight, solid losses—but despite your commitment to doing things right and having good vibes about the progress, it just...halts. That's what it feels like reviewing the latest business data from Interior Design's Rising Giants, our ranking of the second 100 largest firms.

Previously, as the Great Recession retreated, there was nowhere to go but up. After those years of recovery followed by prosperity, the last couple of reports provided respectable results if not gaudy gains. Then, in the 2016 report, the Rising Giants actually failed to rise, losing 3 percent on total fees. This time, fees again ticked up, 4 percent to \$475 million, which is good news but not the \$506 million that was forecast. Rising Giants now predict fees of \$530 million, and we're hope-hope-hoping. Still, no one can dispute that overall business has been good, and the current data bears that out.

meaning colleges and universities, jumped 20 percent to \$23 million, with \$26 million forecast. Meanwhile, hospitality, always a big moneymaker, fell 25 percent to \$130 million. Retail dropped 30 percent to \$21 million, residential 14 percent to \$60 million.

Rising Giants installed \$12.6 billion in furniture-fixtures and construction products, up 14 percent. This has been a healthy part of the business, in the 10-digit realm, for the past three surveys. The firms are gunning for \$14.2 billion next time. As for square feet of work completed, Rising Giants are reporting 271 million and forecasting just slightly more, 276 million. Lowball? We shall see. Fees per square foot came in at \$89, right in the middle of the \$85 to \$98 range established for the past nine surveys—the outlier being \$104 in 2015.

As for where the work takes place, more and more Rising Giants are staying in the U.S., and 98 firms are betting on domestic growth, especially in the South and West. A mere 8 percent of firms took foreign work, the lowest number in a decade. It's also worth noting that work in every single non-U.S. region declined. If there's any international heat in the near future, and 46 percent of Rising Giants say there will be, it's likely to be found in China and the Caribbean.

Another interesting facet of the business lately is sustainability. Coming out of the Great Recession, green work increased steadily. But as healthy growth returned overall, the green numbers have leveled off or even fallen. On the other hand, green-related fees have reversed a few years of decline to tick up to \$104 million, 28 percent of all fees. For installed products, 45 percent were green, and the \$5.3 billion total is the highest since records have been kept.

Total interior design staff came in around 2,800, up 3 percent. Rising Giants hope to hire another 300 soon. Salaries have mostly held steady as well, with designers earning \$65,000, project managers/job captains \$93,000, and principals/partners \$152,000. Hourly billing rates per employee haven't changed either. Steady as she goes, just not upward.

Perhaps one of the reasons for these good-but-not-great results is another bit of information that hasn't changed for a while: Rising Giants say that their biggest business challenge is earning proper fees for work and educating clients on the value of design. The classic tussle.

There's that other tussle, too: plateau versus optimism. Of the existing Rising Giants, 60 reported making money, but it's worth noting that nine out of 10 firms expect business to grow. We'll take it! After all, plateaus are meant to be surmounted. —Mike Zimmerman
